




Finding your post-16 destination is definitely a marathon, not a sprint! The eCLIPS website is one online resource which gives you options to search for different types of careers, as well as giving more detailed information about jobs within different career sectors. If you are interested in careers further afield, or apprenticeships, there are some ideas below too. Try out some of the activities below to search.


To log in to eCLIPS, the password is **OX11OXF**.

<p>1. eCLIPS: Career search</p> <p>Login to eCLIPS (password OX11OXF) and search for various careers options available using the Careers Wizard and Careers A-Z functionality. More detailed instructions on how to do this are below.</p>	<p>2. eCLIPS: Employability and work choices</p> <p>Use the employability and work choices tab on the eCLIPS website to find out what working life in various jobs might be like day-to-day. For each job you can view in-depth employment details to help you narrow your choices. More detailed instructions on how to do this below.</p>	<p>3. eCLIPS: Post-16 education</p> <p>Use the education tab on eCLIPS to find out about post-16 training and education choices. Research options after year 11, the funding that is available and the types of courses that are open to you. More detailed instructions below.</p>

1. eCLIPS: Careers search




To find the wizard, click on 'View Careers' (circled in yellow above). Then click on 'Careers Wizard' (circled in yellow below).




You can now use the wizard to find careers/jobs you might be interested.

Using either your own ideas, or ideas from the careers wizard, you can now research what these jobs might be like.

You can access the 'Careers A-Z' by clicking on the link (circled below in yellow)




Using the link, you can then search for jobs – click on a letter to find your job – you might find some new ideas too – for example, I have clicked ‘T’ for teacher – but there are lots of other jobs beginning with T too!


Try answering the following questions from your research:

- 2). Do you think your personality might suit this job?
- 3). What qualifications do you need to have?
- 4). What is the pay and working life like?
- 5). What do you think would be your favourite part of this job?
- 6). What do you think might be the most challenging part of this job?


You could always search for 2 or 3 different jobs and then you can compare different careers.

2. eCLIPS: Employability and work choices

From the home screen, make sure Employment is highlighted (circled in large yellow circle above) and then click on 'View Employment' (circled in small yellow circle above).



Scroll down to 'Work Choices'. These sections tell you about all the different types of scenarios that you might find yourself working in – including a working from home section (very relevant for now!). Choose 2 or 3 different work choices to compare them.




Try answering the following questions:


- 1). What are the advantages (good things) about this type of work?
- 2). What could be the disadvantages (bad things) about this type of work?
- 3). Would this type of work be suitable for you and the job you want to do? Why/why not?

You could then discuss this with the people in your house – what are their opinions? What types of work have they experienced? This might be a great discussion/debate to have!


3. eCLIPS: Post-16 education




From the home screen, make sure that Education is highlighted and then click 'View education'. There are lots of different sections to look through, but the most relevant for you in your year 11 journey is likely to be the 'Further Education' section, as shown below.
