I feel very proud to be Headteacher of St Birinus School. This pride comes not from one particular aspect of the school but from everything about it.

Last Sunday I participated in the Remembrance Parade and Service in Didcot. I was accompanied by a group of fantastic students from Years 7, 8 and 9 who wore their uniforms **with pride and laid a wreath at the town's war memorial. This was very impressive. This year, for the first time, St Birinus students have been involved and they were an integral part of a superb evening. Every so often a group of students come along in a school who are genuine pioneers – the first to do something, to break the mould – and this group of students is in this category; they have done something for this first time and done it brilliantly. We are very proud of them indeed and would also like to express a huge thank you to Mrs Hook for her work in supporting them to shine.

# Geography

Geography is a fascinating subject as it requires a real blend of skills, meaning that there is nearly always something that every student can say is a 'strength' area. This includes ideas such as describing patterns on graphs, interpreting data, explaining relationships between events/ ideas as well as applying knowledge that has built up to unfamiliar circumstances.

However, one of the challenges that many subjects now experience is the volume of content which exist in the new specifications. Some can be quite challenging concepts and there is certainly a good volume of 'facts' to be learnt. Understanding how to revise for Geography is an art in itself, and like all skills, the more you practise the better you get and the easier the skill is to perform.

To support you to be successful at Geography you need to master 2 key skills - *remembering* the key ideas and facts, and *understanding* how to apply this knowledge into exam questions. Both skills can be honed with practice and this is what has been so impressive with the way the Year 11s have been applying themselves to their weekly revision challenges since September. Sadly, without a secure knowledge of the key content (facts, key words, concepts, techniques etc.) it is very hard to score well on the exam questions.

I would therefore encourage anyone currently looking to develop their revision skills (irrespective of subjects studied) to look through the pages in this week's edition of 'The Saint' to explore a range of techniques that will help you master the content or core knowledge. With these range of techniques you will become increasingly confident with the core knowledge you need to know, enabling you to be better able to focus on how to communicate that knowledge to an examiner/ assessor. This is where the support and direction of your teachers will be invaluable - help them to help you by starting revision early and looking to focus on learning the core content!
